

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A Letter From The Vicar



'Our Father who art in heaven.'
This is the opening of one of the most well-known and well used Christian prayers. Jesus taught it to his disciples when they asked him how to pray.

Known as the Lord's Prayer it encourages us to address God as 'our father' and to ask him for all our needs. The Lord's Prayer begins by praising God and recognising his holiness. We also pray: Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.' Christians believe that God is the creator of heaven and earth.

As creator, he knows what is best for us and for our world. We pray that God's kingdom will come on earth; that his priorities will be our priorities. Jesus said that the most important thing is to love God and love our neighbour as we love ourselves. We can help that day come closer by living in a godly way.

During the period between Ascension and Pentecost from 9th to 19th May, 'Thy Kingdom Come', an initiative of the Archbishop of Canterbury, will encourage people across the world to pledge to pray. You are invited to join the global wave of prayer. The first 'Thy Kingdom Come' initiative was in May 2016 when 100,000 Christians pledged to pray. That number has grown year on year, and in 2023 Christians from nearly 90% of all the of the countries world participated in praying for friends and family.

This praying together has been across our diversity and our differences as every person, household and church are encouraged to pray in their own way.

'Thy Kingdom Come' in Kildwick, Cononley & Bradley will start with a service of Holy Communion on 9th May, Ascension Day at 7.00pm at St Andrew's Kildwick. We will then each be encouraged to pray every day that God's Spirit might work in the lives of 5 specific people who have not

responded with their 'Yes' to God's call.

Those 5 people are for you to choose to pray for. There will be some free prayer journals available in each of our churches on 5th and 9th of May if you would like to come and collect one.

Whether you have joined in 'Thy Kingdom Come' before or not, we invite you to take partalong with churches from over 80 different denominations and traditions in nearly 90% of countries around the world.

Archbishop Justin Welby writes:
"In praying 'Thy Kingdom
Come' we all commit to playing
our part in the renewal of the
nations and the transformation
of communities." I hope you
will come along and get
involved in 'Thy Kingdom
Come', the global prayer
initiative.

Living in Love and Faith: 'the work goes on' Bishop Martyn tells General Synod



Firm proposals for a settlement to enable the C of E to move forward together amid deep differences on questions of sexuality and marriage will be developed over the next few months, General Synod has heard.

The Bishop of Leicester, Martyn Snow – the lead bishop for the 'Living in Love and Faith' process – spoke of the growing desire in parishes for the C of E "to reach agreement and get on with serving our nation."

This General Synod was the first since the prayers of dedication, thanksgiving and seeking God's blessing for same-sex couples (known as Prayers of Love and Faith) came into use during public worship in the Church of England.

Separate proposals for special standalone services for same-

sex couples to be formally authorised under canon law are also under consideration, alongside questions including clergy entering same-sex marriages and whether new structures may be needed to hold the Church together in a new context.

The debate concluded without a vote on the main motion after Synod members agreed to a procedural motion to move to next business.


Speaking after the debate, Bishop Martyn said: "We've had an opportunity for an open, thoughtful – and gracious – debate about how we might move forward together as a church in the next stage of the implementing our decisions on Living in Love and Faith and the work of reconciliation amid our divisions.

"However, there is more work to be done to develop concrete proposals on really important questions we face and a number of people thought it would not be helpful to proceed to a vote without those concrete proposals. I can see the logic in that.

"I was struck by the generous and gracious tone of the debate and I'm grateful to Synod members. I believe my brothers and sisters on Synod would not have been here if they did not believe that some degree of communion is still possible. That gives me great hope and great reassurance that we will find a way through this.

"What I'm picking up very clearly though is a growing desire in parishes for the Church of England to reach agreement and get on with serving our nation.

"So that will be my priority in the next few months as we seek to develop concrete proposals before the next meeting of Synod this summer."







Putting faith into greener banking

The Big Bank Switch

Three Christian campaign groups, Operation Noah, Just Love, and JustMoney, have launched 'The Big Bank Switch' campaign. They are inviting Christians around the UK to align their money with their values by switching from a bank that funds planet-destroying fossil fuels to one that doesn't.

The climate crisis isn't just happening, it's being funded – sometimes by those of us who are most concerned about caring for God's creation, and all because we have a bank account with HSBC, Barclays, Santander, NatWest, Chase, Lloyds or another high street bank.

Banks make their profits by investing in projects, owning shares in other companies, and lending money (with interest). For most banks in the UK, this involves directing a portion of their funds towards companies which are involved in fossil fuel extraction and expansion: the of climate driving cause breakdown, Between 2015 and 2021 banks have pumped over £4.4 trillion into the fossil fuel industry.

The good news is that some green banks are already paving the way. Green banking is the practice of using customer power to support a bank which does not actively contribute to climate breakdown. Plus, giving support to the social and environmental projects green banks often invest in instead.

The Big Bank Switch campaign is encouraging people to switch their bank account to a green bank. Operation Noah, Just Love and JustMoney have partnered with Switch it Green who have made it easy, quick

and safe to switch to a trusted, ethical UK bank. Their aim is that many Christians taking this action on the same day will deliver a clear message to bank executives that we have no faith in fossil fuels, pressuring these banks to stop funding climate breakdown.

Christian Why are these organisations launching this campaign? They believe that God's creation is a gift that we have a duty to care for, and that the wellbeing of creation matters to God. To quote Phoebe Edmonds, a Quaker, 'I have a deep concern for our global and local community because of my faith, and so could no longer use a bank which didn't also respect this, or caused intentional harm to others.'

Who are Abigail Housing, one of our charities in 2024?



Abigail Housing are a West-Yorkshire based charitable company dedicated to providing support and homes to refugees and asylum seekers who find themselves destitute on our streets.

This includes those who have been refused asylum but cannot reasonably return to their country of origin and those given refugee status who have to leave their NASS housing.

It is estimated that there are several hundred men and women in Leeds and Bradford who have been made destitute because they have been refused asylum. Many of individuals cannot reasonably return to their country of origin because of persecution and insecurity. They may have been refused due to a lack of understanding in questioning, a lack of English or because they have provided muddled information to the Home Office due to re-telling a story which was a harrowing experience for them. They are stuck in the UK without the right to work or to any state funding. Many of these people are forced to work

illegally and often in dangerous situations and are homeless.

Our Destitution Project offers these individuals an alternative by providing them a room in a shared house, a weekly allowance, food parcels, bus money, advice and support and signposting services. Our aim is to see our residents' emotional, physical and spiritual wellbeing be cared for to allow them the stability they need to appeal their negative decision or consider their other options.

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

Finding Expression - and God's Response - in Lament

of suffering The question regularly comes up discussions about science and faith. I once visited a school to speak to some of the older teenagers. One of the pupils had sadly passed away from cancer a few weeks before and his classmates asked, "How could God let this happen?" Of course, these young people's questions about where God was in this situation were important. But the chaplain also gently reminded the class that their friend's family were Christians, and that they were finding that their experience of loss had brought them even closer to God than before.

One way that grief can bring us near to God is when we share it with Him, telling Him exactly how we feel. The biblical writers had no scruples about expressing themselves to God, giving vent to emotions we often hold back in a church context. As my colleague Roger Abbott has written in his book on 'Unanswered' Prayer, "Let us

not confuse reverence with spiritual prudishness. Perhaps honesty, the way it feels, is precisely what God is waiting to hear from us."

About one third of the Psalms express some form of grief. The book of Job is a series of responses to one man's suffering as he loses his children, property and health in quick succession. Lamentations is also one long outpouring of sadness at what happened to Israel under the Babylonians. Some of the prophets, especially Jeremiah. also express their pain at these sort of events - which reflect of something God's feelings at the suffering of His people.

Most of these biblical authors would have had access to Scriptures that encouraged them to turn to God whatever the circumstances. Emboldened by their knowledge of His character and promises. these divinely inspired writers even express their anger to God about the things He lets happen, or complain that He seems to act unfairly or ignore them in their plight. Not only do these

people let out all their feelings without fear of reprisal, but they also clearly expect a helpful answer. Some record a resolution to their troubles – often simply because God speaks to and comforts them, enabling them to keep going

The biblical writers demonstrated that God can handle pretty much anything – anger, blame, bitterness – if we are actively looking to Him for help. As Pete Greig of the 24-7 prayer movement has written, "pain that is not expressed can never be transformed".

Where were you born and where did you grow up?

When did you become a Christian?

My poor neglected cello and a stack of music.




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A Prayer for Peace

The Ascension

'While He was blessing them, Jesus left them and was taken up into heaven.' (Luke 24:51).

The Ascension is a hugely neglected festival, which deserves to have a bigger place in our church life. How do we understand it?

The Ascension tells us that Jesus is in control: 'Jesus has gone into heaven and is at God's right hand' (1 Peter 3:22). Jesus occupies the top spot in the universe; the control of our world is in the safe, scarred hands of Jesus. We can offer Him our worship and allegiance, knowing that His plans are better than those of any Prime Minister or President.

The Ascension tells us that God is committed to His world: 'And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with Him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus' (Ephesians 2:6). Jesus did not leave His humanity behind when He ascended, for we are raised with Christ to heaven. Therefore, God is bound to His world and we can trust Him to fulfil His purposes for our lives and world.

The Ascension gives us a job to do: 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore, make go and of all nations' disciples (Matthew 28:18,19). Amen.





Bishop Tony to Retire This Summer



The Rt Revd Tony Robinson, Bishop of Wakefield, will retire this summer after 42 years of ordained ministry.

Bishop Tony, one of five Episcopal Area Bishops in the Anglican Diocese of Leeds, came to the then Diocese of Wakefield as Archdeacon of Pontefract on September 1, 1997, and so describes himself as "incomer" to Yorkshire for 27 years.

Ordained in 1982 in the Diocese of London, he began ministry as assistant curate at St Paul's Church in Tottenham and later moved to be Team Vicar in the Parish of The Resurrection, in Leicester. In 1989 he was made Team Rector and in 1992 the Area Dean of Leicester North.


On December 6, 2002 he was consecrated as Bishop of Pontefract in York Minster by the then Archbishop of York, David Hope and after the creation of the Diocese of Leeds in 2014, he became its first Bishop of Wakefield in 2015.

"Having spent nearly two thirds of my 42 years of ordained ministry here in Wakefield the time has come to retire. Sue and I have loved living in Yorkshire and it has been a great joy to share in the lives of countless people, clergy, parishes and communities," said Bishop Tony.

"The creation of the Diocese of Leeds was something that I couldn't have imagined back in 1997, but it was worth all the incredible upheaval and adjustment under Bishop Nick's leadership so that is ready to face the challenges facing the Church of England today."

In tribute to Bishop Tony's constant and faithful work for the church and communities, the Rt Revd Nick Baines, Bishop of Leeds said:

"I first worked with Bishop Tony in the Diocese of Leicester from 1991 where we were both incumbents and then area deans. It was a privilege to serve with him then and, later, to follow him to West Yorkshire. "This diocese will dedicated pastor, wise counsellor and exemplary bishop. In wishing him and Sue a long and happy retirement, with they go our love, gratitude, prayers and blessing."



Bishop Tony will retire on August 31, 2024 and his final service will be a Eucharist in Wakefield Cathedral on Saturday, July 6 at 11am. Everyone is welcome.

International Nurses Day

The work of nurses is celebrated around the world on 12th May. That day was chosen to be International Nurses Day because it is the anniversary of Florence Nightingale's birth.

We need more nurses! Currently there are about 46,800 vacancies. Could this be a job for someone you know?

May 21st - We remember St Helena

Helena should be the patron saint of all mothers who help their sons achieve great things.

Helena was born at Drepanum in Bithynia about 250. Although stable-maid only а innkeeper's daughter, she caught the eye and affections of a Roman general, Constantius Chlorus, while he was stationed in Asia Minor on a military campaign. She bore him a son, Constantine, in about 272.

But Constantius was ambitious, and when he became coemperor (Caesar) in the West in 292, he abandoned Helena in order to marry the stepdaughter of his patron. Helena and her son were sent to live in the court of Diocletian at Nicomedia, where Constantine grew up as a member of the inner circle. Helena never remarried, and lived close to her son, who was devoted to her.

Then, in 306, Constantius died, and Constantine became Augustus of the Roman Empire. He brought his beloved mother to live at the imperial court.



When Constantine became the first Christian emperor of Rome, Helena also became a Christian. She was devout. dressing modestly, and giving generously to churches, the poor, and to prisoners. But soon Constantine had other plans for her: they agreed that she would help him locate the relics of Judeo-Christian tradition in Palestine. To aid her, Constantine gave her the title Augusta Imperatrix, and unlimited access to the imperial treasury.

And so, from 326-28, even though she was very old, Helena explored the Holy Land on behalf of her son, the Emperor. She went to Bethlehem and founded the Church of the Nativity. She went to the Mount of Olives and founded the Church of Eleona.

She went to Calvary and tore down a temple built to Venus over the tomb of Jesus. Constantine then ordered the building of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. Helena also seems to have founded the chapel at St Catherine's Monastery.

Helena died in 330 in the Holy Land, with Constantine at her side. He brought her body back to Constantinople and buried her in the imperial vault in the Church of the Apostles.

We owe to this special mother and son the preservation and honouring of the most famous sites of Christianity.

St Andrew's Kildwick Nave Roof Repairs




The sight above will be a familiar one if you have attended St Andrew's for any reason over the last nearly 10 years.

Well we have some good news. Starting on 1st July 2024, work to repair the roof will start. This part of the project will repair Bay 1 up to and including Bay 9 as can be seen on the plan below. The work is scheduled to take 2 months. This means that St Andrew's will be closed in July and August to allow this work to take place.

The next part of the project, Bay 10 to Bay 12 will involve some work on the external roof as well and is currently scheduled to start in May 2025.

Unfortunately, there will be periods during the work when the Car Park will have to be closed, but we will try and keep this to a minimum.
